2 PREAMBLE

The Constitution provides a vision of a united, prosperous, non-racial and non-sexist society; a country that belongs to all who live in it, united in its diversity. The Constitution also obliges the country to heal the divisions of the past, recognising that South Africa emerged from a system where the majority of its citizens were robbed of opportunity. We lost the land, how it began we will never know. The battle for the air or spectrum as we know it is no different to the blood that has been spilt for the land since the arrival of the first ship on African soil.

Under the previous apartheid system, a plethora of policies and legislation was promulgated with the sole objective of denying black people, including black women, access to and control of South Africa's economic productive resources and skill based







purely on race and gender considerations.¹ More than two decades after the demise of this apartheid system, and in spite of the promulgation of a broad range of policy and legislative instruments introduced by the democratic Government aimed at redressing the imbalances of the past, the majority of South Africans are still excluded from ownership and control of economically productive assets and possession of strategic skills to the detriment of economic development, employment creation and poverty-eradication.

Since the dawn of our democracy we served the air "Spectrum" on a silver platter and again on a gold platter 14 (fourteen) years ago giving birth to current data monopoly controlled by the 4 (four) Telco's today. We have made it impossible for smaller black owned companies to enter the space, hence the high data cost today. There is no guarantee that they will drop the data prices should spectrum be given to them.

In support of the National Development Plan, 2030 the objective is that the country can create 11 million jobs by 2030 by:

- Improving economic policy coordination and implementation;
- Building partnerships between the public sector, business and labour to facilitate, direct and promote investment in labour-intensive areas;
- Raising competitiveness and export earnings through better infrastructure and public services, lowering the costs of doing business, improving skills and innovation, and targeting state support to specific sectors;
- Strengthening the functioning of the labour market to improve skills acquisition, match job seekers and job openings, and reduce conflict.

Meeting the objectives of the plan requires leadership to drive implementation, and to convince South Africans of the need to make mutual sacrifices for longer-term benefits. It will also require a change in the structure of the economy and the pace at which it grows.²

Over the next several years the world economy is expected to grow at a modest pace. In these circumstances, South African businesses need to think carefully about what they produce, for which markets, using what capabilities. As a small open economy, South Africa can develop niche products. Capturing a small share of global demand in areas where local firms can compete can have a big impact.³ Regional economic integration can boost economic growth in all countries in southern Africa. The region has grown rapidly over the past decade, with strong performances in minerals, agriculture, telecommunications and tourism. Achieving economic integration requires identifying practical opportunities where cooperation can offer mutual benefits;

investment in infrastructure; strengthening regional trade-blocs; lowering tariffs; and addressing nontariff barriers, such as inefficient border posts.⁴

South Africa needs to implement its economic policy priorities effectively. Coordination failures, split accountability and overlapping mandates hinder the implementation of existing policies.

Compared with the best international standards, South Africa's ICT infrastructure is abysmal. Efficient information infrastructure that promotes economic growth and greater inclusion requires a stronger broadband and telecommunications network, and lower prices. The economic and employment benefits outweigh the costs.⁵

3 INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND OF COMPLAINANTS

Collectively we speak for our 4 000 members who are Africans in general and Blacks and Designated Groups in particular, and who operate in the ICT sector. These 4 000 members have an interest in participating in the process to respond to the WOAN memorandum. We wish to see the scale tilt correctly to fairly include Black people, Women, Youth and people with disabilities as key to the economic transformation aspirations of South Africa in order to reverse the injustices of apartheid economy.

As representatives of different SMME and entrepreneurship organizations, our position is clear - <u>Access and Ownership of WOAN</u> is critical to an inclusive economy in this fourth industrial world. We wish to see the scale tilt correctly to fairly include Black people, Woman, Youth and people with disabilities.

The current status quo in South African telecommunications sector has dismally failed to create economic growth as it is monopolized.

4 ICASA

The Independent Communications Authority of South Africa is an independent regulatory body of the South African government, established in 2000 by the ICASA Act to regulate both the telecommunications and broadcasting sectors in the public interest. CASA regulates the electronic communications, broadcasting and postal industries in the public interest. Its key functions are to:

- Make regulations and policies that govern electronic communications, broadcasting, and postal industries
- Issue licenses to providers of electronic communications services, broadcasters and postal services
- Monitor the environment and enforce compliance with rules, regulations and policies
- Hear and decide on disputes and complaints brought by the industry or members of the public against licensees
- Plan, control and manage the frequency spectrum
- Protect consumers from unfair business practices, poor quality services and harmful or inferior products

4.1 Problems with licensing which creates anti-competitive environments and prevents new entrants to the market

There are currently 505 issued IECS and IECNS licensees and this list was prepared by ICASA 10 (ten) years ago and has since not been updated. Many of the licenses are dormant. We attach this list as **Annexure "A.'** On the annexed list one only sees a description of "National" and no information is given about licenses held per district.








A article published by Business Tech⁶ reports the following: "All four of South Africa's mobile network operators have published their latest local subscriber data, with Cell C announcing on Tuesday that it has added 600,000 new customers to a total of 16.3 million subscribers. While this figure is up from the 15.7 million subscribers the network had in June 2017, it is flat from the same 16.3 million reported in December of that year. MTN recently reported that its subscriber base hit 30.2 million subscribers in South Africa, adding 700,000 new customers, while Telkom and Vodacom both announced increases in their most recent full year results. Vodacom added 1.5 million new customers, taking it to 41.6 million users in South Africa, while Telkom saw its user base jump to 5.2 million customers – up by 800,000 customer. South Africa also has a growing mobile virtual network operator market, which is more difficult to track. The MVNO market includes the likes of Me&You Mobile, Pick n Pay, MRP Mobile and others. Most of these networks run on the Cell C network, however, and the mobile operator pegged the number of subscribers tied to these networks at 1.7 million in its latest report."

Diagrammatically the market share can be expressed as follows;



In a country with 95 million mobile connections we are perplexed with how we are to connect all underserviced areas and 25 000 schools with only 4 (four) Telco companies (MTN, Vodacom, Cell C, Telkom) that are for many years monopolizing the industry. Rain and Liquid Telecom have also entered this elite list.

The Electronic Communications Act of 2005 Chapter 3, section 5 (9) states that:

"the Authority must, in granting a licence—

- (a) ensure that electronic communications network services, broadcasting services and electronic communications services, viewed collectively, are provided by persons or groups of persons from a diverse range of communities in the Republic; and
- (b) promote the empowerment of historically disadvantaged persons including women and the youth and people with disabilities, in accordance with the requirements of the ICT charter

Chapter 10 titled Competition Matters, section 5 provides in section 67(5) that:

- "A licensee has significant market power with regard to the relevant market or market segment where the Authority finds that the particular individual licensee or class licensee—
- (a) is dominant;
- (b) has control of essential facilities; or
- (c) has a vertical relationship that the Authority determines could harm competition in the market or market segments applicable to the particular category of licence."

Chapter 10 Section 6, 7 and 8 provides further that ICASA must assess the market, its pro-competitive terms and whether there is market dominance by one or a few license holders.

It is against this background that we request an investigation into restrictive horizontal and vertical practices of license holders and whether ICASA has done this review as prescribed by the Act. We request further that the commission conduct a formal enquiry in respect of general state of competition in the ICT market from the side of the Regulator (ICASA).

4.2 License Costs

The license costs for an individual IECS license is R 12 187.00 which enables you to register a network however to operate and build a network you need an additional IECNS license which costs an additional R 12 187.00. A new entrant would thus have to cough up R 24 000.00 for a license which only lasts for 2 (two) years then has to be renewed. These costs have become unaffordable for SMMEs who wish to enter the market.

A class license costs R 12 187.00 which is equally ridiculous. With a 65% youth population we are seeing an influx of SMMEs who have no inherited wealth to afford the costs of these licences. This creates a barrier to entry. The short validity period of such an expensive license discourages financial success of a SMME as profits are only seen after three years. Class licenses will allow operators to deploy networks in the rural townships where they live. A practical solution would be to waive the fee for 3 months or create a 12 - 24 month payment mechanism for a SMME.







A license transfer cost for an individual license is R 63 804.00 which probably explains why there are so many unused/ dormant licenses.

We take into cognisance that at this stage a black SMME faces a plethora of challenges i.e. it still has to access funding which has its own red tape and hefty requirements that it might not meet, it costs money facilitating all these applications and tender applications in order to survive, the owner has to live, feed his family and survive on current small income and it has no inherited wealth. The SMME has not even started operating but is burdened.

4.3. Moratorium on issuing of individual licenses

Chapter 3, Section 5 (10) of the ECA provides that Individual licences—

- (a) "may be issued for a period not exceeding twenty (20) years unless a shorter period is requested by the applicant or determined by the Authority at the time such applicant applies for the licence; and
- (b) may be renewed in accordance with the provisions of this Act."

ICASA has placed a moratorium on individual licenses which prevents issuing and has not lifted this moratorium. An individual license allows licensees to apply for allocation of licensed spectrum as many of our SMME ISPs are currently using unlicensed spectrum. A layman's explanation of the impacts of using unlicensed spectrum means that users are competing with other users for priority. As an unlicensed user, you have no protection from interference on the part of other parties. Companies using unlicensed bands for IoT deployments run into reliability and performance issues more frequently than those using licensed spectrum, in part because they simply can't control what other people do. (It may work today but it might not tomorrow because a baby monitor was placed in the vicinity of your smart meter, for example.) That makes it a risky choice, particularly for companies concerned with liability and security issues. Using your own licensed spectrum, you can, for example, transmit for three seconds (instead of the unlicensed limit of 400 ms) and send the signal ten times farther, thanks in part to the lower noise level and less competition.

Therefore, besides all other barriers to market access a SMME has to overcome, once it is eventually able to deploy and operate a wireless network it only has access to unlicensed spectrum which means more operational expenses due to disturbances and less profits than the elite counterparts who have licensed spectrum allocation.

The process for issuing an individual license is set out in Chapter 3, section 9 of the ECA.⁷

The ripple effects of the moratorium are clearly felt by potential new entrants generally and black and Historically Disadvantaged SMMEs particularly.

4.4 Turnaround times and response rates of license applications

When a new application is submitted, ICASA takes more than 3 (three) months to respond to an application. As stated above the licensee list was update 10 (ten) years ago and it is not clear why ICASA does not have the capacity to issue licenses and why their regulations have prevented entry to the mainstream market.

In summation of the issues with the Regulator we quote from the Mid Term Strategic Framework (MTSF) 2014-2019: Pg 9 where it states the following:

"Government recognises the need to consider the compliance burden and complexity of laws and regulations, and the need to improve consistency and remove unnecessary obstacles to business development. Capacity is being created in the Presidency to carry out thorough impact assessments of both new and existing legislation and regulations, in order to ensure alignment with the NDP and reduce the risk of unintended consequences.

Government will also streamline and improve the efficiency of regulatory processes, in areas such as building licences, environmental impact assessments, company registration, tax compliance, work permits for scarce skills, mining licences, water licences and access to municipal infrastructure services."

If one sees the direction Government is taking with regards to unnecessary regulatory burdens, we find it fitting that ICASA adopts the same approach.

5 ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATIONS ACT (hereafter "ECA")

The Electronic Communications Act (ECA) was published for public comment to be amended to which we provided commentary as industry stakeholders. We were then informed via the media that this amendment process was put on hold by Parliament and no new date has been communicated for this process to be finalized. The importance of the amendment, *inter alia*, was that it streamlined license processes and placed several regulatory duties onto the Authority (ICASA) to ensure new entrants have access to the market and it tasked the Regulator with the duty to conduct a market analysis every 12 (twelve) months so as to prevent dominance of operators.

We attach our commentary on the amendment of the ECA as "Annexure B".

We herewith call for legislative review on the current ECA as it lacks the ability to fully transform the ICT sector and does not encourage competition, alternatively we request that the amendment process continue and be finalized so that the amendment can be gazetted and promulgated.







6 TRANSVERSAL CONTRACTS

The current structure is that Government Departments obtain contracts from appointed network providers for e.g. Vodacom or MTN. The weaknesses in appointing one network provider is that over years prices will reduce so having a fixed contact means that prices cannot be amended to save Government money. Treasury must create an open platform per province and open up the opportunities for all SMMEs in all Provinces. This means that money is spread and the economy is stimulated Nationally.

We request a enquiry into these contracts for a determination on whether they are inclusive and whether they stimulate competition.

We attach our response to Treasury with regards to the latest Request for Information on Transversal contracts as **Annexure "C and D"**.

7 DEPARTMENT OF TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND POSTAL SERVICES PROCESSES WHICH CREATES LEGISLATIVE AND POLICY UNCERTAINTY

We wish to highlight 5 extremely important State Led Processes (Documentation) which are under way that affect mobile (IMT) services in South Africa which in turn require the National Treasury's attention and alignment in order to achieve bigger government objective of transformation of the telecommunications sector and address economic injustices of the past as well as diversification of procurement of mobile data and voices services in South Africa.

- 1.2 The National Treasury embarked on a different procurement mechanism to reduce the State total cost of ownership on this category of procurement. The solution departed from the traditional manner of procurement which is a consumer centric approach and which entails buying consumer packages, to procurement of an enterprise centric approach, which entails buying a single solution for the State.
- 1.3 As the journey continues for the National Treasury to modernise the state procurement system, in addition to other continuous interventions, the identification of numerous projects to reduce the State spending is also on the rise. It is against this background that the National Treasury seeks to understand the progress and level of market maturity since the first transversal contract RT15-2016 for mobile communication services was established.

2.1 How can the current transversal contract be improved?

The current structure is that Government Departments obtain contracts from appointed network providers for e.g. Vodacom or MTN.

The weaknesses in appointing one network provider is that over years prices will reduce so having a fixed contact means that prices cannot be amended to save Government money.

What we propose is that Treasury must have an open access system - As PBICT we can let our SMMEs have partnerships with different Network Providers in different Provinces so that Government has options between different providers and so that it is not forced to use on one network provider. This means that money is spread and the economy is stimulated Nationally.

We propose further that Treasury must create an open platform per province and open up the opportunities for all SMMEs in all Provinces.

2.2 How can the current scope of mobile communication services be improved?

Firstly, we take note of RFI -RT15-2020 and we support and commend all Austerity Measures by our National Government to save on costs and the efforts to create efficient procurement vehicles that help the government to save costs and improve efficiency of the state's daily operations. However, we wish to express a major concern on misalignment on various government initiatives related to matters that affect consumption of Mobile Telecommunications (data and voice) services in South Africa.

We wish to highlight 5 extremely important State Led Processes (Documentation) which are under way that affect mobile (IMT) services in South Africa which in turn require the **National Treasury's attention and alignment** in order to achieve bigger government objective of transformation of the telecommunications sector and address economic

injustices of the past as well as **diversification of procurement of mobile data and voices services** in South Africa.

We urge The National Treasury, ICASA and the Minister (Stella Ndabeni-Abrahams) to study all the documents below and respond to this letter and advise if you believe that processes below have any material impact on RT15-2020 or not.

With the implementation of the WOAN we will see many new MVNOs which will be extremely positive because it will mean more competition and reduction in costs.

We propose a distributed procurement strategy; meaning that Treasury must have an ecosystem that can procure from various options and using varies SMMEs and leveraging off existing network infrastructure like that of Vodacom, MTN and Cell C.

This encourages a shared management approach which is an open access model/ shared economy model that uses a distributed ledger system with technologies like Block chain technology which can show you costs, market, comparison show Treasury where they are saving

2.4 How will you charge for your proposed alternative procurement strategy/strategies?

- ✓ We looking at around **2 million** to develop the strategy and build ecosystem.
- ✓ For implementation i.e. testing, training, integration etc. we estimate to costs around **15 million**.
- ✓ The above system runs on open source technologies.
- ✓ To integrate we use Minimum Inter-operability standards (MIOS)
- ✓ For security we can use Security Minimum Info Security System Standards.
- ✓ We also propose that we can take advantage of technology like big data analytics.

What is critical is the Distributed Procurement System which includes contract management through migration.

Our advantage and proposed approach will allow for a technology and service provider diagnostic which is independent of service provider technology and allows for the open access platform. The flexibility is that when client procures a device they aren't forced to use a specific network provider. This means that cheaper networks providers can be sourced and stimulates an open free market.

In summation our proposal is that Treasury should not only appoint one network provider rather they must appoint ISP's that will have the ability to provide the same service better and cheaper but using the existing networks operators and this depends on client preference and costs for that area. There must be some diversity in the system.

We are of the view that DATA MONOPOLY which is controlled by the few needs new players which are BLACK and SMME's. Our programme which is aimed at addressing the DATA issues is directed at Government and ICASA, we call all Black SMME's in the area of ICT to join us in partitioning government to do the following:

Issue spectrum licenses to Black SMME's which will assist Government in rolling out the SA Connect project.

Government must ensure that Black SMME's are in the forefront of the internet of things project and not the Digital Monopoly which already controls the lion share of the ICT spend.

ICASA must be transformed and re-structured to better perform its role as a regulator and must be called to investigate why South Africans are paying so much for data

Black SMME's must roll out the free Wi-Fi project supported by Government and this roll out must empower and develop the skills of Black SMMEs in the space of networking from design to implementation and maintenance of the networks

ICASA must revoke all licenses which are not in use by the time of expiry date which will then give an opportunity to those who can use it to do so. This will prevent the current situation where you have 27 licenses issued and only 25 are not used for 10 years or more and our people are the ones on the wrong end of the stick.

2.22 If you were to be one of preferred suppliers, how will your company contribute to job creation in reducing the unemployment rate?

Our organizations have over 3000 members collectively and about 1500 of these members are SMMEs who currently provide between 3 – 8 jobs per SMME. The problem is that they do not receive enough work to financially sustain a large salary bill.

If one does the numbers we see that if SMMEs can receive a cut of this highly monopolised industry we can push up employment numbers to between 10 - 12 employees per SMME seeing job creation of $15\ 000 - 18\ 000$ just on this one contract.

The only way to create more jobs is to appoint, support and stimulate SMMEs.

Most importantly is that payments from government must also be made within 30 days for financial sustainability and so that companies can pay salaries monthly and on time.

2.23 In dealing with related State service and support, are you as a potential supplier in a position to use a subcontractor/subcontractors1 as a mobile administrator to deal with all service and support on behalf of a State institution as part of cost containment than the State to hire additional mobile administrators to manage the mobile affairs of the potential supplier.

YES, we are in a position to use subcontractors as mobile administrators. We have Project Managers on our SMME database that we can propose for consideration.

2.24 Is your company in a position to fully sponsor repair centres (mobile technical centres) nationally that will be managed by subcontractors as part of mobile device repairs?

YES. Once we have an appointment letter for a contract like this funding is easy to obtain because there is work that will be done and there is return on investment for any funder.

2.25 As a potential supplier will you fully assist subcontractors to run repair centres on your company's behalf as part of job creation, skills development and transfer?

YES. We have more or less 200 SMMEs in our organisations that can come on board to offer skills and skills transfer.
